### 2002, CHICAGO, ILLINOIS

On November 24, I flew to Chicago, Illinois, to check out several hotels for our 2002 reunion. The events of recent months have put a severe strain on the tourism industry and I will say that I believe we are doing fairly well negotiating the contract for next year. While none of the hotels were willing to give away the house, most have made several concessions that were not considered last year in San Diego. After contacting the Convention and Tourism Bureau and explaining our needs and price range, I had dozens of hotels to choose from. I narrowed the list down to about eight facilities and requested proposals. From the packages that I received, I decided to visit six properties, spending at least one night in four of them. I checked out two Hyatt Regency Hotels, two Sheraton Hotels, a Holiday Inn and a highly recommended Clarion Hotel. One by one, I had to narrow the list down to where I could make

a decision on where we would hold our 2002 Reunion.

My highest priority in selecting the hotel was the service and condition of the property. I was also adamant about keeping our room



rate under \$100.00 per night. After quite a bit of negotiating, I selected the Sheraton Arlington Park Hotel in Arlington Heights, IL. I could go into great detail on how I made my decision, but regardless, I am certain that you will agree with the choice I made. This is a beautiful property, the food is excellent, the staff courteous and professional and they are quite eager to host our 2002 Reunion.

We are still in the process of negotiating the rate, definitely under \$100.00 per night. Our itinerary will be the same as in previous years, Wednesday will be an early check in day, Thursday will include an all day tour, Friday will include a day tour and a buffet dinner. Saturday morning we will again have a short business meeting in the morning followed by a short afternoon tour. Saturday evening will be the banquet dinner followed by live entertainment. Sunday morning will be farewells until the 2003 reunion.

Our hospitality room needs are included at no charge, provided we meet our minimum room block. The hotel is providing the complimentary rooms to satisfy the requirements from San Diego Reunion raffle table drawing. The Sheraton does not provide free shuttle service from O'Hare however we are working on arranging a special rate if at all possible. Parking at the hotel is free for those who drive the the reunion.

## 2002 REUNION SURVEY

In the last newsletter, I mailed each former crewmember a 2002 Reunion Survey. So far, I have had 89 of these surveys returned to me. As I stated at the bottom of each survey, it is not a commitment, it is just a survey that I use to help determine how many busses we will need for the tours, what size facilities we will need for meals during the tours and the number of rooms that will have to be blocked at the hotel. If I don't receive your survey, I must assume that you will not be attending the reunion. If, at a later date, you should decide to attend, it could cause some difficulties in the planning of the reunion and associated events. So, if you are definitely not planning to attend, please advise me. If there is a slim chance that you will attend, then check the appropriate box on the survey sheet and return it to me. This survey is just one of the tools that I use to help plan the reunion. I would appreciate your assistance, it makes planning a successful reunion so much easier.

The survey requests basic information that is essential in making plans for tours, meals, bus transportation and guides. The 2002 Reunion will be held at the Sheraton Arlington Park Hotel in Chicago, Illinois, from August 21 - 25, 2002. This will be our fifth reunion. Please note that this year the reunion is at the end of the month, a different week than previous years. During our annual business meeting we hear comments and suggestions from the membership in attendance and, so far, I have heard no complaints about our basic itinerary.

In the event you still have not returned your 2002 Reunion Survey, please do so as soon as possible. If you feel, right now, that you will definitely be attending the 2002 reunion, barring some catastrophe, mark the **100% Sure** block on your survey. If you feel that you are going to give it your best shot, but reserve the right to change your mind, mark **75% Sure**. If you would really like to come, but have a few obstacles in your way to work out, give me a **50% Sure**. If you know that you will not be able to make this reunion, then respond with **Can't Attend**. *Regardless of your answers today, you can always change your mind at a later date.* **Remember, it's a survey, not a commitment.** **Please** take a moment to complete this survey and return it to me, it is very important.

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## FROM THE HISTORIAN

I just replied to one of our Association shipmates who sent me a request for periods of service "In Country" Vietnam while aboard PG-92 for a VA claim. It took me very little time to establish the PG-92's "In Country" dates from the ship's history files. With our membership getting older, I suspect that there will be more claims made to the VA regarding Agent Orange. Claimants will need specific dates to establish periods of "In Country" service. I may be able to establish dates of "In Country" for the ships from the Association Historical files. Please keep in mind that many of these historical files are incomplete or missing all together. Right now the only ships histories that I have are for PG-90, the two years that I received from David Robinson covering his tour as Commanding Officer. Most of the remaining ships histories that I have are incomplete. I am looking for any information on ship's histories in order to complete our files.

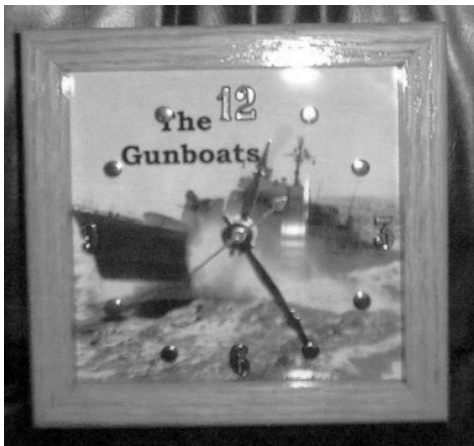

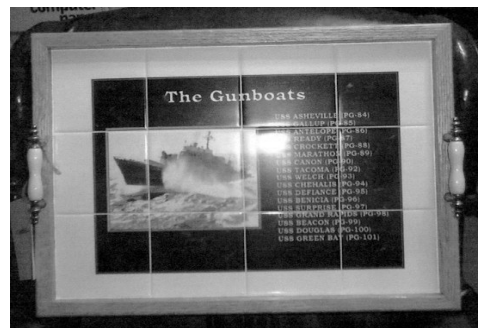
## K&E CRAFTS

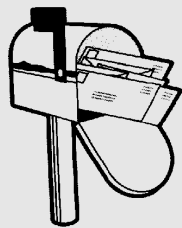
If he doesn't have the photograph that you want, you can send him additional photos for him to use for your purchase. Payment is made directly to K&E Crafts. I have seen



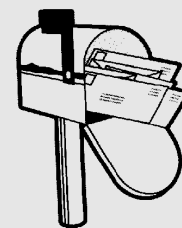

On this page, I want to print some of the comments that I have received from shipmates who either call or write to me. Due to space restrictions, I cannot include all of these comments. I will include those for which I have space in the current publishing period.

## CHRISTMAS

I received this from a shipmate of mine, if it isn't a true story, it should be.....

Dear Admiral,

This letter is a year late; nevertheless, it is important that you receive it. Eighteen people asked me to write to you. Last year at Christmas time my wife, our three boys and I were in France on our way from Paris to Nice. For five wretched days everything had gone wrong. Our hotels were "tourist traps," our rented car broke down; we were all restless and irritable in the crowded car. On Christmas Eve, when we checked into a dingy hotel in Nice, there was no Christmas spirit in our hearts. It was raining and cold when we went out to eat. We found a drab little joint shoddily decorated for the holidays. It smelled greasy. Only five tables in the restaurant were occupied. There were two German couples, two French families and an American sailor, by himself. In the corner, a piano player listlessly played Christmas music. I was too stubborn and too tired and miserable to leave. I looked around and noticed that the other customers were eating in stony silence. The only person who seemed happy was the American sailor. While eating he was writing a letter, and a half-smile covered his face. My wife ordered our meal in French. The waiter brought us the wrong thing, so I scolded my wife for being stupid. She began to cry. The boys defended her, and I felt even worse. Then at the table with the French family, on our left, the father slapped one of the children for some minor infraction, and the boy began to cry. On our right, the fat, blond German woman began berating her husband. All of us were interrupted by an unpleasant blast of cold air. Through the front door came an old French flower woman. She wore a dripping, tattered overcoat and shuffled in on wet, rundown shoes. Carrying her basket of flowers, she went from one table to the other. "Flowers, monsieur? Only one franc." No one bought any. Wearily she sat down at a table between the sailor and us. To the waiter she said, "A bowl of soup. I haven't sold a flower all afternoon." To the piano player she said hoarsely, "Can you imagine, Joseph, soup on Christmas Eve?" He pointed to his empty tipping plate. The young sailor finished his meal and got up to leave. Putting on his coat, he walked over to the flower woman's table. "Happy Christmas!" he said, smiling, and picking out two corsages, asked, "How much are they?" "Two francs, monsieur." Pressing one of the small corsages flat, he put it into the letter he had written, then handed the woman a 20-franc note. "I don't have change, monsieur," she said, "I'll get some from the waiter."

"No, ma'am," he said, leaning over and kissing the ancient cheek. "This is my Christmas present to you." Straightening up, he came to our table holding the other corsage in front of him. "Sir," he said to me, "may I have

permission to present these flowers to your beautiful wife?" In one quick motion, he gave my wife the corsage, wished us a Merry Christmas, and departed. Everyone had stopped eating. Everyone was watching the sailor. Everyone was silent. A few seconds later, Christmas exploded throughout the restaurant like a bomb. The old flower woman jumped up, waving the 20-franc note. Hobbling to the middle of the floor, she did a merry jig and shouted to the piano player, "Joseph, my Christmas present, and you shall have half so you can have a feast too." The piano player began to beat out "Good King Wenceslaus," hitting the keys with magic hands, nodding his head in rhythm. My wife waved her corsage in time with the rhythm. She was radiant and appeared 20 years younger. The tears had left her eyes and the corners of her mouth turned up in laughter. She began to sing, and our three sons joined her, bellowing the song with uninhibited enthusiasm. "Gut, gut," shouted the Germans. They jumped on their chairs and began singing in German. The waiter embraced the flower woman. Waving their arms, they sang in French. The Frenchman who had slapped the boy beat rhythm with a fork against a bottle. The lad climbed on his lap, singing in a youthful soprano. The Germans ordered wine for everyone. They delivered it themselves, hugging the other customers, bawling Christmas greetings. One of the French families ordered champagne and made the rounds, kissing each one of us on each cheek. The owner of the restaurant started singing "The First Noel," and we all joined in, half of us crying. People crowded in from the street until many customers were standing. The walls shook as hands and feet kept time to the yuletide carols. A few hours earlier, a few people had been spending a miserable evening in a shoddy restaurant. It ended up being the happiest, the very best Christmas Eve they had ever spent. This, Admiral McDonald, is what I am writing you about. As the top man in the Navy, you should know about the very special gift that the U.S. Navy gave to my family – to me and to the other people in that restaurant. Because your young sailor had the Christmas spirit in his soul, he released the love and joy that had been smothered within us by anger and disappointment. He gave us Christmas.

## 2001 REUNION SAN DIEGO, CALIFORNIA

### 2001 REUNION

The 2001 Patrol Gunboat Reunion was held in San Diego, California, at the Red Lion Hanalei Hotel from August 8 - 12, 2001. Nancy and I arrived on Tuesday and like every year, spent the day unpacking and unloading all the goodies. Since we were on the West Coast this year, we went ahead and shipped the majority to the hotel. The coffee mugs were shipped direct from the manufacturer as were the foam Koozies that we gave away at registration. The photo albums and newsletter binders were shipped to Paul McGurgan for storage and delivery when we arrived. Paul, along with Carl Little and Dave Donaldson spent many hours helping arrange the display area of the hospitality room.

This is the first year that we didn't have a banquet room for our Hospitality Room. The Hanalei provided us with a two room poolside suite for hospitality. As always, we needed a registration area for checking in, Ballcaps and other giveaways, information and of course hugs and handshakes. The registration area took up half of one room, chips, pretzels and snacks along with the beer took up the other half. One bathtub was for soft drinks (imagine that, using a bath tub to keep the drinks cold) and the remainder of that bathroom was used for storage. In the other room, we had the furniture removed and set up tables for Dave Donaldson's impressive display of memorabilia.

And then, there was the ship. With a few strings being pulled by Admiral Rempt, we were fortunate enough to have a scale model of the USS ASHEVILLE (PG-84) on display during the reunion. This model was provided to us by COMNAVSURFPAC. I had made contact earlier with the bureau and asked about the possibility of acquiring this model for the reunion and was informed that these items were never loaned out for functions such as a reunion. I was aware that the Asheville model was located in San Diego and that it was in the lobby at COMNAVSURFPAC. I had completely given up hope when a member of Admiral Rempt's staff contacted me and said that it could be arranged if we wanted it. So, to make a long story shorter, we did manage to have

the model on display at the hotel.

Carl Little picked up the model of the Asheville from the Naval Base and delivered it Wednesday morning. Shortly after that, Paul McGurgan arrived with the boxes that we had shipped to him several weeks earlier., mostly administrative items and more memorabilia for



the Hospitality Room. Carl, Paul and Nancy spent most of the morning preparing the Hospitality Room for the first arrivals, we were scheduled to open at noon. While they were preparing the Hospitality Room, I headed for my 10:00 appointment with the sales manager and hotel staff.

### Pre-Con Meeting.....

Each year just prior to the start of the reunion we have a "Pre-Con" or Pre Convention meeting with the hotel staff. The hotel arranges for us to meet each of the management personnel who are responsible for the events that we will be having. At the Pre-Con meeting, we meet the Catering Staff, who would be responsible for the Buffet and Banquet dinners, the Registration Desk Manager, responsible for checking in each of our members, the hotel bar manager, housekeeping, audio visual personnel, maintenance, all the folks at the hotel who were responsible for making our reunion a success. It is at this meeting that we discuss any possible problems that may come up during the reunion. This year for example, we discussed the fact that in the contract, I set the banquet total at between 120 and 130. I arrived at this total based on the responses from the Survey that we had mailed to each member of the Association. To the total number of responses, I added several to accommodate for new members, and factored in additional guests based on the number of people that I figured would attend without sending back their survey. My estimate was based on the results of the three previous reunions.

## Our One Major Glitch.....

Let me first mention that when a problem comes up at the reunion, we all work to solve the problem. If the problem is a result of a mistake made by the hotel, I think it is natural to make certain that the sales manager is aware of the fact that the problem is due to an error on their part. The first major glitch however, was due to an error on my part. We ran into a major problem when the total number of guests for the Banquet Dinner hit one hundred seventy.. The room reserved for the banquet was sufficient to seat one hundred forty at round tables of eight, with enough room for the dance floor and the band. With one hundred seventy guests, the dance floor had to be relocated to the other side of the room, tables had to be set up on the dance floor and then moved after dinner. The height of the ceiling and the location of the ceiling fixtures prohibited the color guard from parading the colors to the head table, so the color guard had to change their program and parade the colors toward the dance floor. The additional number of guests meant that we would have to seat ten at each table instead of eight, and that we would need two additional tables. It was a small problem, it was easily solved, but it was avoidable. I use the survey to assist in making arrangements for the reunion, it is an important tool and it is essential to making each reunion a success.

## I like beer.....

Each year we arrange to have beer on draft in the hospitality room. We also arrange to have non alcoholic beverages available to the members as well as chips, pretzels, crackers and other snacks to munch on in the hospitality room. For the snacks and soft drinks, we usually go out Tuesday or early Wednesday and purchase what we need at a local Sam's Club or Price Club. For the beer, the hotel has always taken care of the keg beer for us. Their price is high, but then they are also responsible for the ice and putting on the new kegs when required. This year, the Hanalei advised us that we needed to arrange for the beer on our own. So, we had a local beer distributor deliver three kegs of beer and rented a tap, a tub to keep it in and purchased cups for the Hospitality Room. It worked out well, and actually saved us quite a bit of money too.



As far as I am concerned, the Hospitality Room is the center of the reunion. It is where everyone congregates when there is nothing scheduled for us to do as a group. Having a poolside suite was interesting however the lack of security made it difficult. We didn't want to lock the doors at night so that the late crowd would still be able to use it. At the same time, we didn't want to risk having unauthorized visitors in the suite either. The compromise was to lock up the display area with the raffle table items, the model of the Asheville, the books and other display items at night and still keep the refreshment and registration area open. Another problem we ran into was when the hospitality room was full, the members tended to gather outside on the lawn. Since we were only one of several suites, we ran the risk of bothering some of the other hotel guests. While it worked out satisfactorily, I hope that we don't have to do Hospitality this way again.

## Thursday, our first tour of San Diego.....

Each year I try to arrange for tours during the reunion. I arrange these tours with a local tour agency and require them to provide air conditioned motor coaches and a guide at all times. Our Thursday trip started off with a guided tour of the City of San Diego. We visited Point Loma and La Jolla. We saw a terrific view of the city from the Cabrillo National Park. After a short stop at Shelter Island and the Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery, we headed to Seaport Village to shop and eat lunch. Before heading back to the hotel, we drove through the City of Coronado and the famous Gaslamp Quarter as well as a drive along Silver Strand Beach, home of Navy Seal Team Training.

## Friday, more tours and a great meal.....

The first stop on our Friday tour was the Veterans Memorial Museum. For our Vietnam Veterans it was a touching experience. The City of San Diego has gone all out in making this museum an excellent display of artifacts from Vietnam. There were uniforms from each of the branches of the service as well as uniforms from many of the other countries that were involved in the Vietnam conflict. It was hard to keep our schedule as many of our members remained longer than we had planned. The miniature replica of the Vietnam Memorial is as awe inspiring as the original in Washington DC. After leaving the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, we headed to Balboa Park and a stop at the Aerospace Museum. Our last stop was San Diego's famous "Old Town". Lunch at many of the fine Mexican Restaurants and shopping occupied most of the remainder of our trip. By four o'clock we were back at the hotel and getting ready for the Buffet Dinner.

At six o'clock, the hotel bar opened and members started to gather for drinks and conversation. Dinner was served promptly at seven. We normally do not arrange for any entertainment at the Buffet, we prefer to entertain ourselves and so far that has worked out quite well. This year, I decided to arrange for a podium and microphone so that following dinner we could have several members get up and tell the group what their attendance at the reunion has meant to them. What I was looking for is some insight into how their coming to these reunions has affected their outlook on life. I thought it would also be interesting to hear about some of the new friendships that have developed between new and old shipmates. What we got was.....

## Saturday, Business Meeting, Tour, Banquet, Dancing.....

The annual business meeting was called to order by Terry McManuels at 9:00 AM on Saturday, August 11, 2001. The following statistics were presented to the members in attendance. As of July 30, 2001, there were 2,061 names in the Association data file. Of these, 784 were listed as regular members with a valid mailing address. Of the 784 regular members in the file, some are duplicate names such as those shipmates who served on more than one Patrol Gunboat.

The data file holds the names of 26 deceased crewmembers. (Included are those who died while attached to one of the ships.) Of the 26 deceased crewmembers, 4 have families who desire to be kept informed

of all Association activities and wish to remain active and on the Association Mailing list. They receive all Association Newsletters and other correspondence. These members do not pay dues and receive an invitation to all reunions and other Association functions. There are an additional 22 deceased crewmembers who have been identified whose families have not been located or contacted, or, have been contacted and prefer to not to receive information about our Association or receive our newsletter.

The membership present was reminded about Association Dues, and agreed that dues should remain at \$20.00 per year. For the benefit of our new members, I will again quickly cover our membership structure.

**Member Status "RP"** - Those members who have responded to the membership dues request and are current with their annual dues. These members will receive all Newsletters and other correspondence regarding Association activities.

**Member Status "RNP"** - Those members who have not responded to the membership dues request. These members receive only the Pre-Reunion and Post Reunion Newsletters. The Pre-Reunion Newsletter is published in March and includes all registration forms and other items required to register for the reunion. The Post Reunion Newsletter comes out shortly after the reunion and it gives a rundown of the events and highlights of the reunion.

**Member Status "M"** - Status "M" which is the "MISSING PERSONS" list.

## SAN DIEGO REUNION SURVEY

I would again like to explain a bit about the Reunion survey and the reason it is so important. First off, as I have said numerous times, it is just a survey, a tool that is used to assist in determining transportation requirements for the tours, how many tour guides and escorts we will need, where we will be able to arrange meals during the tours and a myriad of other details. This survey is our only way to gauge, in advance, how successful a reunion might be. The final negotiated room rate is dependent on the number of guests who will be staying at the hotel. The cost of the meals at the hotel and the final cost for all tours is determined by the anticipated number of participants. In short, the data gathered from the survey is essential to the efficient and cost effective arrangement of virtually every event during the reunion.

I averaged the results of our three previous reunions and developed a formula to compute a ratio of positive responses to actual attendees. I used this ratio to determine what we could expect for participation at the 2001. Reunion and signed the contracts based on the results. This past year, out of 719 Survey's mailed, I received a total of 114 responses. Of those, 85 indicated that they planned to attend the San Diego Reunion. There were 21 crewmembers who were 100% sure that they would attend, 24 who were 75% certain and 40 who were 50% certain that they would attend. Using the data from the previous reunion surveys, we should have had an estimated 38 former crewmembers plus their guests in attendance in 2001. Next I factored in the number of attendees who came to Peoria, Falls Church and Saint Louis without submitting a survey and used those figures to make plans for this years reunion. This year, we had 19 former crewmembers show up with out submitting a reunion survey.

Last year, we had problems with the advance room block at the hotel. I computed the required room block based on the results of the survey. The problem is that we can be penalized for failing to meet our room block, and the hotel can also refuse to honor the

group rate when we exceed the guaranteed block. There is some flexibility here when we need to increase the block a couple months before the reunion, but when we are asking for additional rooms at the group rate after the cutoff date, many hotels are reluctant to agree. This year we blocked 180 paid nights and at the cutoff we were at less than eight five percent of our block. Last minute reservations took us over the top and we had no penalties for failing to meet the required number of rooms. We did an excellent job of meeting the requirements this year. If there is any area where we can do better, it would be for me to get a better understanding of the number of local members who show up unexpectedly. This was the primary reason for the Banquet Dinner count going so far above what I had figured on. Just remember, even though there is a penalty assessed to the Association for late cancellations, we have always provided a full refund to those who have to cancel. There is simply no reason not to make advance reservations with the hotel. If there are any penalties, the Association will absorb them out of our funds. In the past, I have tried to make this clear to everyone, yet again this year we had at least one crewmember show up at the hotel without making advance reservations. The result, he ended up staying at a different hotel at a higher rate. As far as I am aware, this was the only instance where I wasn't able to get the rate reduced to our group rate for the entire reunion. The bottom line here is, make your reservations early. When three people show up at the hotel and there is only one room left, the hotel will charge the highest rate it can. Remember my favorite quote, "It's just business".

Simply put, I cannot over emphasize the importance of the Reunion Survey. Please try to have it completed and returned to me by November 30, 2001. This will make planning the 2002 Chicago much easier and result in a better Reunion for everyone.
